# **Class Objective:**

Stage Design Graphics II is dedicated to providing students with the basic tools, techniques, and understanding necessary to read, comprehend, and graphically communicate technical drafting. This will be done via exercises in hand drafting, beginning with basic concepts, moving into drawings of abstract and real elements, and culminating in groundplans.

# **Class Format:**

In order to comply with social distancing guidelines, this class will be taught in a hybrid online and in person format.

The lecture portion of the class will be held online live via Cisco Webex on Canvas. These sessions will include an in-class critique of the previous assignment, followed by a lecture/demonstration of new concepts, and conclude with a description and explanation of the corresponding assignment. Classes will be recorded for reviewing.

Additionally, each student will schedule a ten minute in-person meeting with the instructor (a "one-onone"). In these individual meetings the instructor will review and provide feedback on assignments in progress.

#### How Projects Are Graded:

Each project will be evaluated on three factors each given equal weight. They are:

**Layout:** This includes neatness, borders, and how objects relate to each other on the page **Lines:** Specificity and consistency of line use as well as proper weights, as well as lettering **Content:** Accurate completion of the assignment itself

**Late Assignments**: Assignments are due at the top of the next class for critique unless otherwise stated. Please turn your assignments into my mailbox outside the design lab prior to the 8 am class start time. Assignments turned in after class, but within the due date will lose a half point. Assignments turned in within a week of the due date will lose one point. Assignments turned in a week late will lose two points and an additional point each week after that.

In the event that campus is closed or you are unable to come to campus, projects will be submitted digitally via Canvas.

# Please note: projects will require a significant amount of outside work and access to the design lab is limited; each of you should establish a work place in your home.

#### Quizzes:

There will be ten single question quizzes, one each day starting the second meeting of class. The quiz will be available via the quiz function on Canvas from 7:00 am - 11:59 pm each class day. Each week's question will reflect a concept from the previous week's lesson.

#### Attendance:

As this is a studio class involving demonstrations and in-class mentoring, attendance at every class is imperative. As TD&P students you are expected to be at all classes unless prior arrangements have been made. (Prior does not mean 5 minutes before class). Classes missed with the permission of the instructor for officially sanctioned OMDA events AKA Conferences, Symposiums, Guest Speakers and the like will not be counted against the student; however, the student is still responsible for the material missed, or due in their absence. **Not having your materials will constitute an absence**, as will being tardy 3 times. Tardy consists of being 15 minutes late or less; over 15 minutes late will be counted as an absence.

More than 2 unexcused absences will result in the lowering of your FINAL GRADE by 1 letter grade and an additional grade for each absence thereafter.

Attendance will be taken at the top of each online lecture.

Lectures may include some in class work so please ensure you at least have lead holders with lead, an eraser, and your scale rule handy for each class. Not having your materials will constitute as a absence.

Attendance at scheduled one-on-one meetings is mandatory each week. Meetings can be rescheduled or moved to an online format with prior arrangements. Please bring the materials required to complete your assignment to your individual meetings.

## **Design Lab Use:**

The design lab is a shared space for TD&P students across disciplines; please keep the space clean. The room is to remain closed and locked when not in use. If you are the last to leave please turn off the lights and close the door. **Drawing tables are for drawing only!** Put a cutting mat or chip board under your work if you are cutting or painting. Food and drink (other than water) must be kept at the front or the back of the room.

Faculty, staff, graduate students, and select upperclassmen have keys to this room. They may grant you access at their discretion. I will open up the lab during scheduled one-on-one times to allow for students to work on projects. Additionally, you may use the lab while I instruct the opposite section (Ie. students in Thursday's class may work while I teach on Tuesday and vice versa).

#### ADDITIONAL INFORMATION

#### Title IX
